President's Note:Scenic Easement Credits

Everyone should have received their new property tax bill and perhaps even paid the first installment on that bill. Hopefully, everyone reviewed their bill and saw a credit from Prince George's County for having a scenic easement on your property. Just in case anyone is wondering how that credit is calculated, it is a simple formula by which the figure for the assessed value of your land (not your house), is divided by 2, and then that sum is divided by 100. As an example, your land is valued by the county at \$158,000. Dividing that number by 2 gets you \$79,000. Divide that number by 100 and that answer is \$790, which becomes the value of your scenic easement credit. The scenic easement credit is deducted from the fees and charges that make up your overall property bill. This credit is not a one-time event. It is given every year due to the scenic easement being held in perpetuity.

If you are a Prince George's County property owner with a scenic easement to the National Park Service (NPS) over your land and do not have a scenic easement tax credit on your current property tax bill, most likely the past owners of your property who entered into the scenic easement agreement never presented that information to the Prince George's County Treasurer's office. Just having the scenic easement recorded does not mean it is automatically noted by the County's Treasurer's office. To rectify this, you need to take a copy of your easement to the County Treasurer's office and see that it is recorded with them so that you may receive this scenic easement credit next year.

If you are a Charles County property owner with a scenic easement to the NPS over your land, you are not yet entitled

to a scenic easement tax credit on your property tax bill. Charles County has never taken advantage of a Maryland state law that allows a county to give a scenic easement tax credit.

As President of the Moyaone Association, I am in the process of trying to rectify this situation. I plan to meet with Thomasina Coates, the District 2 representative on the Charles County Commission. I am also planning to elicit the help of the Charles County Conservancy and the Charles County planning staff who are involved in the viewshed protection for Mount Vernon. I will report back on the success of this quest.

Last shoe dropping . . .

According to the attorney for the Moyaone Association, David Bookbinder, the final legal details on the proposed Charles County compressor station project are now really at an end. The DC Circuit Court has dismissed, at our request, our case against the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). FERC amended Dominion Energy's Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (aka the permit) back in August to get rid of the station. However, before this case was asked to be dismissed, we just wanted to make sure that the time expired for Dominion to ask FERC to change the Certificate back to allow them to build the station. With the clock finally run out, we are all done now.

On behalf of the Moyaone Association I thank David for taking this case on and for seeing it through until the end. His advice throughout this whole ordeal has been invaluable. Please tell David, wherever you see him, how much you appreciate his involvement and actions on behalf of the Moyaone Association.

Please Water Your Trees

It's historically dry out there! The time to water is now! Here are some tips to help:

For newly planted trees (planted 1-3 years ago):

- 1. These trees are the most susceptible to damage/death due to inadequate water.
- 2. Water slowly. The ground is hard and dry—water will run off if too much is applied too quickly.
- 3. Place a hose a foot or so from the base of the tree and turn it on to a trickle. Set a timer to let the water run for one to two hours. Occasionally moving it the hose nozzle to provide water to the entire root zone of the tree. If you have a small sprinkler head you can use that to cover a wider area but again turn it on to low.
- 4. You can also water with a 5-gallon bucket that you have drilled some (three is sufficient) holes in the bottom about the diameter of a pencil lead. Place the bucket at the base of the tree, fill the bucket to the top with water, let it drain, move it slightly, and fill it again—up to five times.
- 5. If you can, place a mulch ring around the tree following the 3–3–3 rule (3 inches of mulch in a 3-foot ring with a 3-inch space around the tree trunk. Mulch keeps the water in the soil feeding the roots by slowing evaporation.
- 6. After you've saturated the soil around the tree, repeat the watering process every three to four days. If you are unsure about when to water again, check our watering alerts: https://caseytrees.org/take-action/water/

For established trees:

- 1. All trees in this drought can use some water, especially street trees. If you have street trees in front of your home letting a hose drip onto its roots for a few hours will be a big help! Move the hose nozzle around every hour or so to water the entire area.
- 2. The rule of thumb in these severe conditions is: WATER!
