GACA to Meet Wed., Sept. 28

The Greater Accokeek Civic Association (GACA) will hold its regular September general membership meeting in person at the Accokeek Volunteer Fire Department Hall (16111 Livingston Road, Accokeek 20607) on Wed., Sept. 28, at 7:30 pm. The program for the evening will focus on issues of South County roadways, in particular Maryland Route 210. Representatives from the State Highway Administration Maryland Department of Transportation will report on the status of maintenance along Maryland 210; a local safety initiative at Farmington Road and Maryland 210; the MDOT Adopt-a-Highway program; and efforts going forward to advocate for roadways in South County. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend to learn more about these important local issues. The Accokeek Fire Hall is large and will accommodate social distancing, though guests are encouraged to wear masks as an additional Covid safety precaution in the indoor setting.

• **Bank Activity** — reconcile monthly bank accounts, approve and release wire transfers

• **Bookkeeping/Data Entry** — data entry for all payments and deposits

• **Other** — work with the Moyaone Association Comptroller in preparing information for annual insurance audits

The Accokeek Artists Alliance (AAA) is hosting an in-home meeting Sat., Sept. 24, 2–4:30 pm, at a member's historic




plantation farmhouse. The meeting will feature a tour of the home and grounds and a presentation by a noted glass artist, Eileen Martin

Biology

Learn about plant biology in the Historic Kitchen Garden. Our crops are growing like weeds and will soon be ready to harvest. Stop by to learn about Indigenous techniques for growing crops, find veggies you like to cook, or find some that you've never heard of before!

Our Java chickens are growing, and we have added a Bourbon Red turkey to our flock. These heritage breeds preserve the history and biodiversity of their species. Learn more about our heritage breeds, including our American Milking Devon cattle, Ossabaw hogs, and Hog Island sheep.

History

Explore history and stories from the past with self-guided tours, available for download online or from the Visitor Center. *Through the Eyes of Cate Sharper* is a special selfguided tour of the National Colonial Farm that features the life of Cate Sharper, a woman enslaved in Prince George's County in the mid-18th century. The pool season is officially over. Congratulations and thank you to everyone who participated in and topped off this year's Labor Day Sunday social and potluck. We hope that you enjoyed the sunny afternoon, the company of friends old and new, as well as some tasty bites. The alternate date, rain date, and additional work day for any unfinished tasks is Sun., Sept. 18 from noon to 4 pm.
