Moyaone Association Budget Meeting

The next significant association event is the annual Moyaone Association Budget meeting, scheduled for Saturday, December 10th. Your board and our standing committee chairs have begun building the budget for next year. I want to take this opportunity to thank our committee chairs for their participation in this critical process and also for striving to remain within this year's budget.

We operate the Moyaone Reserve on a slim margin through our annual dues, some pool revenue, and fundraising. Our goal is to hold the current line on dues and pool fees,

The Reverend Thomas Davies Clay 1938 – 2022

The Reverend Thomas Davies Clay, age 84, died on Friday, September 9, 2022 at his home in Accokeek. Thomas was born in 1938 in Huntington, West Virginia, and spent his childhood in Kentucky. He graduated from Marshall University in 1960, and then from the Episcopal Theological Seminary in Kentucky in 1963. He was ordained an Episcopal priest in 1963, and for the next 35 years served congregations in Kentucky, Georgia, Virginia, and Maryland.

In addition to being an active parish priest, Thomas was an avid paper modeler and woodworker. In his later years, he specialized in recreating European cathedrals, sharing them with the world on his website, <u>cathedralquest.com</u>. In 2017, Catholic University showcased some of his work at an exhibit, "Great Churches in Miniature."

On his website, Thomas described how his abiding interest in cathedrals began: "One of my favorite memories is that of my first visit to the Washington National Cathedral in 1953. I was fifteen, and my Great Uncle Oley took me on a C.&O. railroad Cherry Blossom excursion to Washington from Huntington. Great Uncle Oley, who never married, was like a grandfather to me. ... We rode all night on the train, toured all of Washington including the Washington Cathedral and Mount Vernon and came home that night. I was awed by the Washington Cathedral which by that time had been in progress for forty-six years with thirty-seven years more before its final completion. Very little of the nave had been completed at that time."

Thomas embraced Kathleen's love of European cathedrals, and during their 25-year marriage they traveled extensively through Europe, visiting castles and cathedrals. After retirement, Thomas served as a docent at the Washington National Cathedral, giving tours to attentive visitors and school groups from across the US and the world.

Thomas was also a prodigious enthusiast of classical music and composers. As with his love of cathedrals, this appreciation began early. When he first began receiving an allowance from his parents, Thomas spent it on clasical records and not the popular Perry Como.

Thomas is survived by his wife, Kathleen Jenkins O'Day of Accokeek, and many other family members.

Preparedness Corner

Emergency Response in the Moyaone Reserve

Any emergency incident requires the timely response of first responders and their related vehicles and emergency equipment. In the Moyaone Reserve, as in many rural areas, we have a variety of challenges which can delay timely emergency response. Some of these hurdles include: Timely and Clear Communication; Location Identification; Road Condition and Accessibility; Distance from Hydrants; and transient obstructions such as snow, fallen trees, and/or parked cars.

Communication: Call 911

If you are experiencing or are a witness to an emergency situation, please call 911. If you are unsure if the situation is really an "emergency," call 911. Some emergency incidents in and around the Moyaone Reserve have been made more complex by delayed activation of the public safety system. All first responder agencies in Prince George's, Charles, Fairfax and any county anywhere will never fault anyone for calling 911 with a legitimate issue no matter how small it may seem to you. Let the 911 system determine what type of response, if any, is needed. Do not call your local firehouse or a neighbor first.

NOTE: If you call 911 from a cell phone in and around the Moyaone Reserve your call may be initially handled by Fairfax, Charles or Prince George's county. All of these 911 centers can and will transfer you to the correct center. See location below.

Location, Location. Two key reminders:

- 1) When you call 911 to report an emergency, give as accurate a location as possible; e.g., "2311 Bryan Point Road in Accokeek, Maryland" is better than "The Moyaone Commons" or the "Moyaone Pool." Not all responding units have been here.
- 2) Is your house address visible? Do you have a reflective sign that is free from vegetation, etc.? The Accokeek Volunteer Fire Department (AVFD) sells, at cost, reflective address signs. Contact alex@accokeekvfd.org
- 3) If first responders cannot find you, they cannot help.

Road and Driveway Condition/Size

Maintenance of shared roads is a partnership. The Moyaone Association Roads Chair provides guidance and direction as warranted. Dirt roads require care and present a challenge year-round to all first responders. If there are washouts, fallen trees upon a road, ice, or mud from poor drainage, emergency response may be delayed.

The width of roads and driveways in the Moyaone Reserve presents real challenges to all first responders but especially to fire and EMS. Our fire trucks and ambulances are wide, heavy, and in some cases long. If delivery trucks, oil or propane trucks, or utility trucks have trouble navigating a road or driveway, fire department vehicles will have as much and possibly more trouble getting to where they need to go. Parked cars, staged building materials, or encroaching vegetation can all hamper emergency response.

We have had several structure fires over the past decade in the Moyaone where the width of the roads hampered emergency response. A parked car in one fire blocked firefighter access.

AVFD continues to offer free site visits to evaluate access to your home. Please contact me if you would like us to come out. We can offer our professional assessment and make suggestions to improve access.

Talk to your neighbors as well and find out if you might have shared access issues that can be resolved collectively. Improving emergency access can be achieved while preserving and respecting both private property and environmental values. Seconds and minutes count in an emergency, so take a few moments to think about how emergency responders can access your neighborhood and your home.

Smoke Alarms: A gentle reminder to evaluate your home smoke/fire/carbon monoxide alarms. Smoke alarms should be placed on every level, in every bedroom, and hallways to bedrooms. If your smoke alarms are over 10 years old – please replace them. Smoke alarms have saved lives in the Moyaone. There are many options available today and AVFD can assist in evaluating your home's needs. Please consider having your alarm system monitored remotely so that there will be rapid notification to the 911 system of an emergency.

Chimney/Wood Stove/Fireplace Safety: As the weather turns cooler, please have your chimneys inspected/cleaned by competent professionals. Burn only dry wood and have a preparedness plan – extinguishers, smoke/heat detectors, etc. Dispose of hot ashes carefully.

Chainsaw Safety: If a tree falls... To begin, chainsaws are dangerous! If you feel uncomfortable using one, please don't! Hire a licensed tree company. We can offer basic chainsaw safety classes for those who are interested. Please reach out directly with questions/interest. If you are not 100% confident in your ability to safely use a chainsaw, don't!

Wildland Fire Preparedness: While the threat of wildland fire in our area is relatively low, there is some risk. The fire community has learned from recent fires that hardening your home and keeping the 5 feet closest to your house clear of flammable materials greatly improves the chance of surviving a fire. Maintaining defensible space is the law within 100 feet of a home in wildfire-prone areas (not in Maryland), and highly recommended elsewhere. If a garage, shed, your neighbor's house or the property line is closer than 100 feet, it is especially important to "harden" the home itself to reduce vulnerability to radiant heat, and to work together with your neighbors to reduce risk—a great way to build community while protecting assets.
