#### President's Note:

#### Members, Friends, and Neighbors — Greetings and Happy New Year,

Thank you to all who participated in our recent Membership and Budget Meeting last month. I think that I speak for all members of your Board when I express our sincere appreciation for your willingness to accept our proposed budget and the attendant increase of our fees. Your funding helps us to be better prepared to handle what nature and/or fate throws us during our operations this coming year.

About this time last year, the Moyaone was digging out of a significant winter storm. Many were without power for several days and some were trapped in their neighborhoods until roads became passable. Trees and branches, brought down by the heavy snow, reduced Cactus Hill Road to a narrow hiking trail through a snow-laden forest. I suspect this was a typical experience along most of our roadways. We recovered from that blizzard fairly quickly though, thanks to our volunteers, equipment, and operators available for clearing our roads, all supported by generous funding provided through our membership dues. While we may hope for a mild winter this year, we'll be prepared for multiple heavy weather events.

As I draft this letter, 2023 Dues Notices are being sent out to all property owners' households. Many thanks to those of you who have stepped up early and paid your 2023 dues. If you paid previous year's rates, please be advised we'll need an additional \$50 for each improved property and an additional \$10 for each unimproved property. I also want to use this opportunity to reach out to those property owners who don't pay. Please pay your annual dues. Our members are charitable, but our Association is not a charity. The majority should not have to subsidize the presence of the few in our community who do not contribute to the preservation of this special place. I'm prepared to have discussion with any delinquent owners regarding your reasons for not paying. Please feel free to contact me with your concerns. My email is listed below.

In closing, thanks again to all for your support in preserving the Reserve.

#### **Phil Wiggins**

Phil Wiggins recently joined the ranks of his eminent elders, a recipient of the NEA National Heritage Fellowship. The fellowship puts him in the company of some of the greatest luminaries in traditional blues and folk music. Phil is a versatile traditional harmonica player, continuing the Piedmont blues tradition, a gentle and melodic blues style of the mid-Atlantic region. His sound is not shaped by the gear, the microphone, or amplifier when performing on stage, but instead by his complex syncopated patterns, breath-control and rhythm, stylistic virtuosity and fiery solo runs. Within the past year he has performed in Sweden, Australia and throughout the US, so it is a rare opportunity to see him in the intimate setting of the Homegrown Coffeehouse. www.PhilWiggins.com

#### Memphis Gold

This special concert will also feature the music of Memphis Gold, who has graced the cover of numerous blues and music publications, and has shared this uniquely American art form with audiences around the world. In this time of musical fads and gimmicks, his music is real and heartfelt. Here's how the British publication *Blues & Rhythm* describes him: "Memphis Gold stands with one foot in the past and one foot in the present...[he] could be one of the youngest (and one of the last) to have picked cotton on the Dockery and Stovall plantations. Appreciative of his roots, yet too young to be completely anchored in the past, his original music moves forward with funky rhythms, odd chord changes and structures, and his own idiosyncratic view of life." www.MemphisGold.com

#### Steve Wolf

The musicians above will be accompanied by bassist extraordinaire Steve Wolf, who has backed many of the finest R&B artists in the mid-Atlantic, plus a range of national artists such as Chuck Barry, Bo Diddly, The Marvettes, and Dr. John. Steve was recently described by blues writer Tommy Lofgren in the Swedish blues magazine *Jefferson* as "Very likely the best blues bassist I have ever seen; versatile with innovative solos. He is well known in Scandinavia after many tours with Tom Principato, pianist Deanna Bogart, and others."
