Senior Tax Credit for Property Owners in Prince George's County

Last June (2022), the Prince George's County Council passed CB-029-2022, a property tax credit for elderly individuals. This new County tax ordinance was signed by the County Executive and goes into effect in 2023.

The basic eligibility for the tax credit is that: 1) property owners must be over 65 years of age; 2) they have lived in the same dwelling for at least the preceding 10 years; and 3) one's home needs to be assessed by the County as being under \$500,000. The credit allowed will be 20% of the County property tax, inclusive of any Homestead credit. The credit shall be granted for a period of up to 5 years.

This tax credit for elderly property owners will be administrated by the County's Finance Department. At this time, the Finance Department is just starting to work on the application process and the application itself. It is hoped that by Spring 2023, the Department of Finance will mail out to all County residents a flyer announcing the process and the application form.

GACA to Meet February 22

The Greater Accokeek Civic Association's next regular membership meeting will be held Wednesday, February 22, at 7:30 pm at the Accokeek Volunteer Fire Hall (16111 Livingston Road, Accokeek). The guest presenters will be from with the Project (PGC LMP), a nonprofit, all-volunteer group that works with the Maryland Lynching Memorial Project and Bryan Stevenson's Equal Justice Initiative (EJI).

The PGC LMP mission statement reads: "to educate the public on the truths of our nation's continuing legacy of the institution of slavery and its impact on enslaved persons and their descendants, memorialize victims of racial terror lynchings in our county [Prince George's], and advance the cause of racial justice and reconciliation through mutual support and collaboration." The guest speakers will discuss the organization's work to tell the untold story of the four documented lynchings in Prince George's County, including that of Thomas Juricks of Piscataway on October 12, 1869. The PGC LMP representatives will also discuss plans for an event honoring Mr. Juricks through a community remembrance project, to feature soil collection, a homegoing ceremony, and a variety of music and other creative arts.

The GACA membership meeting will also include regular reports and business, including updated Accokeek census information and information about proposed Maryland Legislative Bills concerning Route 210 speed cameras.

Moyaone May Day on April 29

Saturday, April 29 marks the second annual Moyaone May Day, to be held at the Moyaone Commons, 2311 Bryan Point Rd

May Day is one of the four ancient Celtic cross-quarter days, making it an astronomical holiday as it falls between the March equinox and June solstice. Originating from its Celtic name, "Belthane," Beltane was a spring celebration that included dancing, singing, and special bonfires; house doors and animals would be decorated with yellow May flowers and ribbons. During this time, in various communities in Ireland, people would visit special wells and the Beltane dew was believed to bring beauty and youthfulness to those around it.

In the Middle Ages, English villages had homes with maypoles to rejoice in celebrations of May Day. Villagers would go into the woods to find maypoles to set up in towns and cities. Because maypoles came in different sizes, villages would compete with each other to see which one had the tallest one.

The Moyaone Morris Dancers will be on hand as your hosts. We have again invited other Morris groups to join us.

1:30 pm—Moyaone Spring Games: Tug-of-War (Adults vs. Kids); Sack and Wheelbarrow Races; Wellie Toss.

Piscataway Park's Not-So-New EDRR Species

In the world of Invasive Plant Management, new invasive species are on the most wanted list, and the process of Early Detection and Rapid Response is how to prevent them from being widely established.

During the winter while these plants are dormant, Accokeek's Natural Resources team has been inventorying and mapping them for future removal or treatment during this year's upcoming active management season. AF would love to have our neighbors involved in this effort, and some of you already are! We have management sessions every Friday from 9:30 am to 11:30 am. To sign up, visit bit.ly/InvasiveManagementAF.

According to the US Department of the Interior, Early Detection and Rapid Response (EDRR) is a "key tenet of invasive species management, where 'detection' is the process of observing and documenting an invasive species, and 'response' is the process of reacting to the detection once the organism has been authoritatively identified and response options have been assessed."

There are currently over 50 known EDRR plant and animal species in the DMV. Under the guidance of the National Capital Region's Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (NCR-PRISM), Accokeek's Natural Resources team has been able to identify 4 of those EDRR species here in Piscataway Park: Leatherleaf Mahonia (Berberis bealei), Crowdipper (Pinellia ternata), Trifoliate Orange (Citrus trifoliata), and Castor Aralia (Kalopanax septemlobus).

If you want to help, but prefer to explore the park, the Natural Resources team could use some help with winter GPS inventorying of Leatherleaf Mahonia, Trifoliate Orange, English Ivy, Castor Aralia, and other plants unusual for this area. To sign up, send an email stating so to volunteers@accokeek.org.

Plants do not recognize human boundaries and can spread from yard to yard. We encourage you to walk your property and see if you recognize some of these plants. Hand-pull or dig up seedlings, ensuring the roots are completely removed. Mature plants can be removed using a weed wrench or similar tool. If a plant is too large to be removed, it may be cut and systemic herbicide may be applied to the cut surface. If you prefer to keep the plants, or are restricted from removing them, carefully cut, bag, and throw away fruits in the trash to prevent spread by birds.
