President's Note: Potholes, Dues, and Names

Neighbors and Friends,

Greetings. "Seventy-nine degrees on Thursday followed by snow on Saturday." You were not alone if you were skeptical of this recent weather forecast. I was sure it would be one or the other, but not both. As it turned out we did enjoy a nice Thursday respite from winter's chill followed by snow sightings just couple of days later. As we move into March it appears we'll see a more normal weather pattern for this time of the year. That said, I'm not a professional weather guesser, and anything could happen. The preponderance of potholes on our Moyaone Reserve roads has not gone unnoticed. Hopefully by the time you read this letter we will have been able to unleash the grader. This recent rain cycle has kept our roadbeds very damp and we'll want a dryer surface that will permit for filling in potholes and sculpting the proper crown.

Now that I have your attention, I have two very important items to pass on to you this month;

- 1. If you have not already done so, please send in your annual Moyaone Association Consolidated Fees: \$820 for improved properties and \$160 for unimproved lots. For those who have sent in the \$770 or \$150 for 2023, please send payment for the difference in order to be reinstated as a member in good standing with our Moyaone Association. These new annual fees were accepted by unanimous membership vote at our December 10, 2022, annual budget meeting. Your payments may be sent via check to our PO Box 113, by Venmo, or via ACH, as prescribed on our dues notices. My apologies that our Annual Consolidated Fee notices for this year went out late, and please reach out to MoyaoneComptroller@gmail.com if you haven't received them via email.
- 2. This next subject involves the title of our newsletter. I respect the legacy of this longtime periodical, which continues to provide much useful information and is an integral part of our community. However, the time has arrived where we should retire the current title of this newsletter. We enjoy the rich history of this special place, which remains

largely intact from before the arrival of the English explorer, Captain John Smith, in 1608. I've learned that "Moyaon" was the site of the "Capital City" of Piscataway, an extensive statesized area encompassing most of what is now Maryland, parts of Delaware, Pennsylvania and Virginia. Moyaon provided everything to sustain generations of Piscataway who thrived on this site for thousands of years. You should know that many Piscataway people live in the local community and frequently visit this area to honor their ancestors, legacy, and culture. I hope you'll agree that using this caricature title. "Smoke Signals," for our newsletter is disrespectful to our neighbors, while we live here on their ancestral lands. It is viewed as an insult, or at least insensitive and tone deaf, that we continue to use this title. Per our bylaws the Moyaone Association Membership will have the opportunity to vote, retire this title, and nominate a new moniker for our famous newsletter, at our May 2023 Membership Meeting. Our Association Board of Directors and I agree that it is time for action to implement this simple, no-cost change. We are receptive to any and all suggestions for a new title.

Thank you for your attention; please reach out with your comments and thank you for preserving the Moyaone Reserve.

Local Organization GACA Works on Our Behalf

Dear Neighbors,

Along with all the other resources that folks' consolidated fees advance, the Moyaone Association's decadeslong partnerships include our mutually beneficial membership engagement with the Greater Accokeek Civic Association (GACA). As an example of its value, here are highlights from recent meetings:

Minutes for General Membership Meeting, November 30, 2022

... [The Prince George's County Officer whose area of focus includes Accokeek] Steven Rannacher urged residents to be cautious about potential "jump-ins" – vehicles left running that are stolen.

... GACA [and other civic partners such as Indian Head Highway Area Action Council (IHHAAC)] offers further concerted actions toward reducing speeding on Rte. 210...

Roadway Advisory Committee—South County (RACS) team report: focused on several issues, notably the need for a sidewalk along Livingston Rd. (Rte. 373) from roughly 15600 to 16400 Livingston Rd. Many crucial organizations (library, fire hall, several churches, et al.) are along this road and pedestrian traffic is considerable. Both state and county jurisdictions are involved and RACS has asked what we can do to support improvements.

RACS has submitted service requests through MDOT's "Know Your Roads" program and the county's "Click 311" program and urges residents to use these tools to report roadside problems (needed road repairs, abandoned vehicles, long-term parking violations, downed light poles, trash, etc.). RACS has found that these submissions have proved successful in getting responsive action. One example has been the improved lighting along Bealle Hill Rd. near Rte. 228.

Accokeek Heritage Tourism Study (AHTS): interaction with WSSC Officials Regarding Piscataway Bioenergy Project at Farmington Road and Rte. 210

At GACA's request, the Water Team from the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission attended the meeting and discussed the Bioenergy Project. The officials included:


