

William Wareham

William Wareham, local artist, former Accokeek lifeguard, and coach and brother of Bud Wareham, passed away April 17 at the age of 82. His works were recognized both nationally and internationally. He was best known for his sculpture works, which are on display at various locations throughout the country. Some of his sculptures as well as his early paintings are enjoyed by our neighbors. Bill had degrees from Philadelphia College Museum of Art and from University of California–Berkeley. He served in the Peace Corps in Peru.

Bill was always interested in saving the environment and that passion was expressed through his art. A number of years ago Bill was featured on *Good Morning America* where he went to a landfill to retrieve junk and turned it into art. Bill was always interested in Native Americans and as a young boy organized all the kids in the community in Oxon Hill to do reenactments of Custer's Last Stand. Of course Bill would always be Sitting Bull. In later years he would take food to the Native Americans when they occupied Alcatraz.

Bill was a long-time resident of San Francisco before purchasing a former dairy farm in Montague, California, where he not only enjoyed amazing views of Mount Shasta but also had space to create and build his sculptures. He remained active in the art community, creating and constructing his sculptures even at age 82. His contribution to speaking through art will be missed. He leaves behind his son, Vasili, and daughter, Aloysia, as well as his brother Bud and sister Nancy. We will miss you, brother.

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR Naming our Newsletter

The March 2023 issue of *Smoke Signals* (see president's message in that issue) suggested there would be a newsletter name change. The May 6 membership meeting sets the stage by including a vote on the proposed change to remove the designated name *Smoke Signals* from the bylaws. I include the following information to help the membership understand why the name *Smoke Signals* is a valid and descriptive name for a communication tool, particularly our Moyaone Association newsletter.

Smoke signals have been used as a means of communication from ancient to modern times, in diverse cultures, and across the globe. Please note that the history of signal fires (signum per ignem) is inextricably interwoven with smoke signals since fire is more visible at night, while smoke is more visible during the day. Here are **just a few** examples of smoke being used as a communication tool throughout history:

- The ancient Chinese are credited with the first use of smoke signals. They used smoke signals along the Great Wall of China to warn of invaders. (The smoke was generated by igniting wolf dung, sulpeter, and sulfur and could relay a message 300 miles away in just a few hours.)
- Moses and the Israelites followed a column of smoke by day (and fire by night) to escape captivity.
- Aeschylus's Agamemnon tells us that the fall of Troy was broadcast back to Sparta by smoke signals.
- Polybius (3rd century BC Greek historian) describes his alphabet smoke signal system.
- The ancient Romans used smoke signals to site roads.
- By royal decree in the 1300s, "beknes" (origin of the word beacon) or signal fire/smoke signal communication mounds/ towers were to be maintained throughout England.
- Both Native Americans and Aboriginal Australians had sophisticated systems of smoke signal communication.
- In the age of sail, ships could communicate by the sound and smoke of cannons. Indeed, marine chronometers, so vital to ship navigation, were set off the Cape of Good Hope by this method.
- The announcement of papal elections in Vatican City is signaled by smoke.
- Numerous people stranded in the wilderness have been found by the smoke from signal fires.

Smoke signals have been used as communication device throughout time, place, and people. Thus, this name is appropriate for a modern-day communication tool, i.e., the Moyaone newsletter.


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While May is water safety month, and while we will be providing you with water safety content throughout the month of May, we know many of you are shopping for this season's bathing suits **NOW**. As supporters of water safety, we encourage you to look at the graphics below, and think about the color bathing suits you choose for both your children and yourself.



Think bright, think contrasting. In non contrasting colors such as blues and greens it is HARD for a lifeguard to see if something has gone wrong and you are on the bottom of the pool.



In a lake or open water, you can see that it is even more difficult for lifeguards, safety personnel, or boaters to see you. This is one of the reasons Crossing Currents Aquatics requires a bright visibility buoy during all of our open water events.

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Can You Hear Me? Acoustics at the Wagner Community Center

Just as an appropriate focus is being placed on road maintenance equipment upgrades, a complementary upgrade of the Moyaone Association's community center acoustics is also both timely and within financial reach. Summaries from two recent open meetings are below in advance of the May 6 Moyaone Association Membership Meeting, to assist voters in identifying and weighing the merits of including acoustic budget outlays alongside other quality-of-life outlays:

A major consideration in choosing mitigation is that this is a multipurpose building, and usage changes the sound. Loud is not better; more than one person speaking greatly reduces hearing clarity. Noise also impedes hearing clarity. The dehumidifier, the AC, the heating, planes passing overhead, two or more groups working separately are all deleterious to hearing clearly.

Diagnosis is easy, the solution is not. Almost anything absorbent will help. Lowest frequencies are primarily controlled by the shape of the room. The Community Center problem is primarily at the level of speech and higher frequencies.

If we apply a fix only to the ceiling, we'll continue to have problems with reverberation (sound persistently bouncing off all surfaces, reducing clarity. Lower frequencies). If we apply a fix only to the walls, we'll have problems with flutter (sound bouncing off parallel surfaces with sufficient delay that it sounds distinct from the original. Higher frequencies). The windows are not a significant source of the problem because of their height in the building.

If we apply corrective measures to both the walls and the ceiling, the sound will be vastly improved. There is a sweet spot between where the sound-absorbing materials are insufficient to our needs and where they are more than necessary—deadening the sound. Our consultant, Prof. Hoffman (Acoustic

Architect, Johns Hopkins University, Peabody Institute), suggests we install 512 square feet of baffles hanging at the ceiling (2 feet x 4 feet x 2 inches thick) and a screened baffle covering the wall closest to the swimming pool. This particular wall was selected for remediation because meetings, music, and events are usually focused on the opposite wall, towards the gardens.

Baffles: Both hanging battens *and* the wall-mounted panels:

- Made with a variety of materials, including fiberglass, cotton, etc.
- Thickness: A 2-inch thickness is the industry default. A 4-inch thickness is more expensive.
- Slatted/slotted faced: better protection of the baffles, but not as great with sound. Really helps with low-end baffles.
- · System longevity: 20 to 25 years
- Cost: Estimated between \$10,000 and \$20,000

Recommended actions include:

The Moyaone Association membership votes to approve an initial budgetary outlay to fund the hanging battens. This action, once funded and under way, can then catalyze a second budgetary outlay and/or in-kind donations for the wall-mounted panels.

Moving forward with some manner of expert-recommended sound-improvement is fiscally within the MA budget, will pay immediate dividends in the improved acoustics — leading to higher community enjoyment and utilization of the commonly-owned facility, and can encourage, and, hopefully, then sufficiently catalyze the additional funds for completing the second of the two acoustic improvement actions.
